#### A Message from Pastor Laura

*Prayer is an earnest and familiar talking with God.* - John Knox, Founder of the Presbyterian Church of Scotland, 1514-1572



Reformation Sunday is coming! We celebrate this church holiday every year on the last Sunday of the month. It marks the anniversary of the monk, Martin Luther, pounding his 95 theses onto the door of the church in Wittenberg, outlining each of his qualms with the Roman Catholic Church. While we often say this is the start of the Protestant Reformation, it had actually begun many years ago with Jan Hus in Prague. Regardless of the history, the last Sunday of October is the

day we celebrate our Reformation heritage.

For the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), our Reformation heritage is centered in Scotland. That's why we have shortbread for communion! (Praise be to God!) Our story begins with John Knox traveling to Switzerland to study under John Calvin. Calvin had already formulated his Institutes, or doctrines of the Christian faith. His writings taught much of what our denomination affirms: the sovereignty of God, the authority of the Scriptures, and the necessity of grace through faith. Knox carried Calvin's teachings with him back to Scotland where he sought to convert the nation to Protestantism.

Though further study reveals that Knox was a problematic historical figure, his influence is profound in Western Pennsylvania. Knox's Presbyterian theology took hold in Scotland, influencing the English Puritans. The Puritans, of course, carried their faith across the Atlantic to Plymouth. The Presbyterians of Scotland also traveled across the Atlantic, carrying their faith with them, settling in our region in the mid-late 1700's. The wave of Presbyterian immigrants from Scottish is evident in Pittsburgh today as one can barely drive anywhere in this city without passing a Presbyterian Church.

To celebrate the Presbyterian Church's heritage, and to have a little bit of fun remembering where our particular flavor of Christianity came from, we will celebrate Reformation Sunday on October 29. Feel free to wear plaid, bring a dish for our potluck luncheon, and get ready to belt out our favorite Celtic hymns to the glory of God. It doesn't matter if you're of Scottish heritage (I'm not) - it only matters that you're here!

# Music Notes By Shelby Gracey

As we welcomed back the Chancel Choir in September after their summer break, we're so happy that one of SHUP's newest members, Jeff Allison, has joined the choir. Welcome to the "choir family," Jeff!

While we're always grateful for the beautiful anthems that the choir presents each Sunday in worship, it's so important that ALL of us join in song as we worship God.

"A New Testament church should always be a singing church, for sacred song is the natural outpouring of joyous Christian hearts. Of all the world's religions, only Christianity is a singing faith. But singing should not be limited to the church services; rather, it should become the Christian's normal daily lifestyle.

"Singing God's praises provides many important benefits to

Many important benefits to believers. There is the awareness that God is pleased when the voice is lifted in praise; he who offers praise honors God (Psalms 50:34). Then we learn many important spiritual truths and concepts when we sing. For many of us, our first awareness that God loves us and that He loves all the children of the world was gained through a song sung at our mother's knee or in the Sunday school nursery. Singing will also provide encouragement and comfort in times of need. Often when we are experiencing periods of discouragement and despondency, a simple hymn will come to mind and will be used of God to mend our fragile emotions. Also, singing is one of our best preparations for heaven. The Bible teaches that we will enjoy giving praise and singing throughout eternity.

"The hymn "Come, Christians, Join to Sing," was originally "Come, Children, Join to Sing." It first appeared in 1843 in a collection Sacred Melodies for Sabbath Schools and Families, edited by the author of this text, Christian Henry Bateman. served Bateman thee Congregational churches in Scotland and England and then was ordained in the Anglican church."

"When tempted to complain or feel despondent, determine to sing a song of praise. It is one of the best ways to experience calm and contentment when life becomes bleak."


