A Message from Pastor Laura

Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger.

- Luke 2:11-12



Two of the best Christmas movies feature angels: *It's a Wonderful Life* and *The Bishop's Wife*. The angels appear as two regular human beings who teach the meaning of Christmas to those who've gone astray. They come as messengers of God. This is appropriate because the root for angel comes from the Greek word, *angelos*. Angelos means, "messenger." Angels are those who bring divine words.

The Advent and Christmas seasons are those in which the angels take strong supporting roles in our Christian story. We will read in the weeks to come of the angel Gabriel. Gabriel appears first to Zechariah, declaring, "I am Gabriel. I stand in the presence of God." (Luke 1:19) He then appears to Mary, inviting her to become mother to the Son of God. The whole heavenly host later appears to the shepherds with, 'tidings of great joy.'

What meaning do these heavenly messengers have for us today? For some, angels hold great significance. Some people purport to have seen angels, and testify to their presence among us. Other Christians think of angels in the same category as Frosty the Snowman: fiction. Still others believe angels are a literary device used by the Gospel authors to support their message. What do you think, and what impact does this have on your faith?

The Adult Sunday School class will explore the theme of the Christmas Angels on Sunday's from November 27 - December 18 during the 9:00 a.m. class in the library. We will be using the Rev. Susan Robb's video series, *The Angels of Christmas: Hearing God's Voice in Advent*, to guide us in the journey of hearing God's message for us at Christmas. I hope you'll join us as we make connections between what God did 2,000 years ago and what God is calling us to through the gift of Jesus today!

Music Notes By Shelby Gracey

During this Advent and Christmas season, we'll have a variety of special music in our morning worship services. Our Chancel Choir, Campanile Bells, and GPM are working hard on beautiful Advent and Christmas music. Also be sure to join us for our Christmas Eve service on December 24 at 7:00 p.m., which will include scriptures, carols, candlelight, and many musical selections throughout the service. It's such a blessing to be able to celebrate the coming of the Christ Child through beautiful, seasonal music!

There are so many wonderful and cherished Christmas carols, it's

hard to highlight just one. However, the First Noel has a rather interesting background that I'd like to share. "Very little is known about its origin, but it's believed to have had its rise in France during the fifteenth century. Noel is a French word originating from Latin meaning "birthday." The song is thought to have been brought across the channel to England before 1823 by the wandering troubadours. The carol under the English form, "Nowell," became a great favorite for Christmas Eve, especially in the west of England. This was when the entire village gathered for singing and celebrating the bringing in of the Yule log. At this time,

carols were thought of as popular religious songs meant to be sung outside the church rather than within.

"The First Noel" portrays in vivid narrative style the story of the birth of Christ. All six stanzas are needed to complete the entire event when the hymn is sung. The sixth stanza urges us to join together to sing praises to God for the marvels of His creation and for the salvation provided through Christ's shed blood. The repetition of the joyous "noel" in the refrain is equivalent to our singing out "happy birthday" to someone."

In fields where they lay keeping their sheep, on a cold winter's night that was so deep.

They looked up and saw a star shining in the East beyond them far And to the earth it gave great light, and so it continued both day and night

This star drew nigh to the northwest, O'er Bethlehem it took it rest, And there it did both stop and stay right over the place where Jesus lay.

Then entered in those wise men three, full reverently upon their knee, And offered there in his presence their gold, and myrrh, and frankincense.

Stewardship By Jody Colby

Stewardship in Oxford languages is the job of supervising or taking care of something, such as an organization or property.

Theologically, stewardship is the belief that humans are responsible for the world and should take care and look after it. Believers in stewardship are usually people who believe in one God who created the universe and all that is within it, also believing that they must take care of creation and look after it.

According to the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church, "giving has always been a mark of commitment and discipleship. The ways in which a believer uses God's gifts of material goods, personal abilities, and time should reflect a faithful response to God's self-giving in Jesus Christ and Christ's call to minister to and share with others in the world. Tithing is a primary expression of Christian discipline of stewardship."

Let me start at the end...tithing. When I was a young adult, I rather dreaded the fall stewardship campaign because tithe preaching would come up. I didn't like it. It made me feel small and sinful. Mostly because I couldn't tithe. We were lucky to pay the mortgage when interest rates were 8.5 %. I now understand there is a lot more to it than money. In essence when you add in material giving, ability giving, and time giving, we all give more than 10%.

Look around you. This place, this organization, this devotion is the

before you, time and talents, abilities, and faithfulness because you are stewards.

For example: The Young Adults, (God bless them) many who grew up in this church, wanted to care for this place, so they offered to redecorate Findley Hall. After all some of them were nurtured in the "big room". They sought your support. They were so successful, and you were so giving, they were able to buy new chairs which will be coming soon. Time, talents, abilities, and faithfulness. That's tithing!

Another example: When the roof over the apses suddenly started to leak because God's creatures were digging into the roofing, cool heads and true grit and your money prevailed. I especially liked the creativity of our Pastor to jerry-rig a funnel directing the roof water into the bucket. That's tithing!

Oh, and I must mention the Monday Morning Marvels, who, some daily and others weekly, prepare the church and grounds for use. For many this is a second home.

When we asked you to write letters to the legislature to press for licensing immigrants, you cared.

When we asked for coats for the needy, for baby clothes for immigrants, for walking the neighborhood to clean up litter, for making blankets for Ukraine you cared.

For donating coats, for labor at Garfield Farm, for service to our neighborhood, you cared.

For sending money to flood, fire, and hurricane devastated areas, you cared.

When we ask you to pledge whatever you can so we can keep our staff, so we can give away 10 % to our communities and individuals in need, you care.

Yes, we tithe. We are stewards in every sense of the word, together and separately, with our time, our talents, our abilities, and our faithfulness. And we are so grateful. Thank you!






All Creatures Great & Small
