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A Message from Pastor Laura

Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die. Do you believe this? - John 11:25-26



Barbie asks on the big screen, "do you ever think about death?" I was struck by this line as I sat in the AMC theater. As a pastor, I think about death all the time. It is literally something I think about every single day. I am thinking about the death of Jesus, as well as his resurrection. I am thinking about those in our church who have died but whose influence carries on in my work. I am thinking about those church members who

may be courting death's door. I am thinking about the family deaths impacting the preschoolers in our building. I am thinking about how we talk about death, address death, process death as Christians who affirm eternal life in the comforting arms of the Almighty. In other words, yes, Barbie, I do think about death. I think about death almost constantly.

I am also thinking constantly about life, both life now and life in the world to come. How can we live this life faithfully, and how may we help one another prepare for eternal life? In answer to these questions, there are two programs I'll be hosting this winter.

First, I will be hosting a Funeral Planning Workshop on **Sunday, February 4** following worship. This workshop will be an opportunity to consider what you would like your funeral service to look like. Do you want your service to be in the church or in the funeral home? Do you want hymns, and which ones? What Scriptures are important to you? We won't discuss what is covered by funeral homes (i.e. burial, flower arrangements, etc.) We will focus, instead, on the funeral service itself. This is because I often meet with families following the passing of a loved one and learn the loved ones have no idea what the deceased would like for their service, or they clearly choose what their loved one would not want. This is your opportunity to provide your church with your desires for a funeral service that reflects your faith.

This will be a vulnerable conversation, as well as a profound one.

Blanket Making From St. Margarets's Church

Merry Christmas blanket makers!

We made 145 blankets this year. They were donated to 6 shelters:

- St. Joseph's House of Hospitality part of Catholic Charities, residential shelter for 60 homeless men
- Pleasant Valley Mens Shelter part of Northside Common Ministries, accommodates the needs of 25 homeless men each night
- Women's Space East serves homeless families with dependent children founded by women who saw a need in 1976
- Light of Life Rescue Mission transforming lives through the love of Christ by providing food, shelter and hope to homeless men, women and children
- Harbor Light Mission part of Salvation Army long-term residential treatment program for adult men with substance use disorders
- Chartiers Center Scott Township, programs focus on the integration of physical health and mental health wellness to enchance the quality of life for people with behavioral or intellectual and developmental disabilities

Thank you so much to all who contributed their time and resources to enable us to get all these warm beautiful blankets out to these facilities. I am sure we can't even know how much they are appreciated by the recipients. These blankets feel like a warm hug!

Although this yearly event started 21 years ago with a small group at St Margaret Church, through the years it has become a community collaboration of like-minded people who join together to produce a mighty large quantity of blankets. We are joined by ladies from St John Lutheran, Sunset Hills United Presbyterian, Ladies of Charity from St Raphael Parish, and many other friends and neighbors.

Mission at the Border

A World on the Move

The number of people seeking asylum in the US has been increasing steadily through the late summer and fall. The Border Patrol is struggling to process all the cases. People crossing the border to ask for asylum in the western part of Arizona are regularly bused to other Border Patrol stations for their paperwork.

The Douglas Border Patrol Station gets a lot of overflow from further west. After processing, people are dropped off nearly every day at the transit shelter in Douglas. This shelter is housed in the Immaculate Conception Catholic Church. Usually they stay for a few hours, get a meal or two, get some rest, get an orientation, and then board a bus for Casa Alitas, the big shelter in Tucson. There, they are helped to obtain plane or bus tickets to the place where their sponsor lives and are guided on their way.

Various groups in the community take turns staffing the shelter each week. Last Friday I was working at the Douglas shelter with volunteers from Frontera de Cristo. In the morning, six men came in. In the mid-afternoon another 34 people came in. In less than an hour we gave them an orientation, took down their information, fed them a meal, and said goodbye as they got on the bus for Tucson.

They were from Mexico, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Ecuador, Peru, the Dominican Republic, and Nepal. Sometimes we welcome guests who speak languages other than Spanish or English. People are crossing the border from all over the world. People are leaving countries in Central Africa, South Asia, and the Middle East. Their lives are threatened and they are seeking refuge in the country that symbolizes for them the hope of a better life.

The world is on the move. War, climate change, poverty, oppression of LGBTQ folks, political repression, economic exploitation, gang violence, and other causes are driving migration. More walls and stricter laws will not solve the



problem, nor will they stop people from migrating. People will do what they need to do to care for their families and find safety.

One rough estimate I heard lately was that about 4% of people who are admitted to the US after a Credible Fear hearing will be granted asylum at their eventual court date (which may be several years away). 16% will be deported. The other 80% will slip away and live in the shadows. There, they will be vulnerable to exploitation, afraid to seek protection from authorities, and trying to survive.

Our priority as a country should be working with other countries to promote safety, stability, peace, and economic opportunity so that people don't have to leave their homes. The migrants I've heard from say they would rather stay at home. But when someone kills your sister or your husband and tells you you're next, and you know the police are corrupt and if you reported it, you'd be dead for sure – what do you do?

They come to our border. They're looking for help in the only place they know to turn.

Douglas, a town of 15,000, has responded in a remarkable way. They have welcomed dozens of people a day in the transit shelter and provided them a warm welcome, a safe place to rest, and something to eat on their way to try to build a new life. This little town in the southeast corner of Arizona does its part to show some kindness to a world on the move. And they do that despite being a town with a high poverty rate, where all the schools qualify for federal assistance. Douglas has set an example for the rest of the country with their hospitality and generosity.







Nursery School Closed Jan 1 & Jan. 2nd The Sunset Hills Nursery School will resume classes on January 3rd.


