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A Message from Pastor Laura

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself.

- Matthew 22:37-39



The decline of Christianity in the West is an invitation to learn more about our faith. I think of the decline of Christianity experienced in the earliest days of our nation. Unitarian Universalism dominated the American religious landscape because it was no longer assumed that one believed in Jesus Christ. Our early nation was a nation made up of Quakers, Jews, and the list goes on. Some of our founding fathers and mothers were Christian. Others,

such as Abigail Adams, Thomas Jefferson, and George Washington, practiced Christian deism - believing Jesus to be human and not God. This era was an opportunity for traditional Protestant Christians, like Samuel Adams, to think critically about what Christianity believes and why.


A pamphlet in Norwich Cathedral in Norwich, England answers the question, "God, Jesus, Church, Christianity: What's It All About?" They begin by discussing Jesus as a historical figure whose ministry is recorded in the Gospels. Christ is presented as resurrected from the dead, and as saviour of the world. The pamphlet goes on to talk about Christian beliefs, including the belief that every human is created in God's image, the Bible as a record of God's relationship with humanity, and Jesus as God's love revealed on the cross and in his victory over death. The pamphlet concludes with how Christians live: Christians live, not by a set of rules, but by Jesus's command of love.

Is the above concurrent with what you believe about the Christian faith? What do you think needs to be added? Do you think the author of the pamphlet prioritized correctly? These questions matter because these are the questions of eternity, the questions of what this world all means and why we are here. This is why we affirm our faith every Sunday, because we are keeping our focus on why we are followers of Jesus and why Jesus calls us to this faith.

When you see a chancel choir member, please be sure to thank them for all their hard work and dedication to the choir throughout the year.

Over the summer we'll have special music from soloists, instrumentalists, GPM, our Ladies' and Men's Choruses, and perhaps some special guests. Men and Ladies of the congregation – watch the Sunday

morning bulletin for announcements about when your groups will rehearse and sing. Everyone is invited to join in singing on these dates! We truly appreciate everyone who offers their musical talents to the congregation over the summer, in order to give the choir members a rest. If we have any hidden talents out there that I'm unaware of and you'd like to sing or play something this summer, please let me know. I'm looking forward to a variety of great music!

Within the next month, some repair work will be taking place on the

organ. Last year there were repairs done to the reservoir on the pedal division. The reservoirs are made of leather, and over time, they deteriorate and need to be replaced. If the leather fails enough to become detached, it affects wind pressure and tuning, and the pipes will fail to operate as they should. Several years ago, the session had the foresight to put money into an organ repair reserve fund, knowing that with the age of the organ, eventual repairs would be needed. These repairs will help to keep our beautiful organ playing for many years to come!

Mission at the Border

Small Victories

Editor's note: Sam and Cynthia Pendergrast are currently engaged in a one-year mission/service commitment in Agua Prieta, Sonora with Frontera de Cristo and partners. They have a blog for sharing their experiences https://avearontheborder.com/posts/. The following article is one of their posts.



The challenges at the border can seem overwhelming. We provide hospitality for recent deportees—a little coffee and food, basic first aid, new socks and underwear, a place to rest. And it's the same thing every day. An average of more than 100 people a day. More than 41,000 last year came through the Migrant Resource Center in Agua Prieta.

So, I'm thankful for small things. Times we share a smile, listen to a story, know how good it must feel for someone to take a shower after walking through the desert.

March 23rd was one of those times. And it was not a small thing, but it was a small victory. Two men had been in the resource center in the morning. They had left, and they came back in after I started my shift at noon. They had been out looking for their wives, with whom they'd been traveling, but from whom they'd been separated after the Border Patrol detained them during the night. Each couple only had one phone between them. "How can we find our wives?" they asked, trying to keep their panic from showing too much.

Fortunately, part of the process the Border Patrol follows is that they notify the Mexican Consulate of every Mexican citizen they arrest. We gave the number for the consulate in Douglas to one of the men. He was on the phone for a while. Then both men left and went out to the small plaza just outside the pedestrian border crossing. About a half hour later, they returned with their spouses, very relieved. They had a meal, sat for a while, thanked us, and went on their way, ready to make another attempt to cross into the United States.

Earlier this week, an entry in the devotional for Lent I'm following cited these verses from Second Corinthians. God said to Paul, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." The writer said that to admit our weakness is not negativity. It's to embrace a ministry that belongs not to us but to God. "Unless we embrace weakness and futility, we'll start believing that the world's betterment hinges solely on us, that we are its saviors and heroes." And that leads to the kind of arrogance and intolerance we see so much of these days in public life.

We offer our gifts, our kindness, our advocacy in the hope and trust that God will bring some good out of the seeds we sow. We offer ourselves, grateful for small victories, even when we think we're not enough. Even if we think we can't win, we can believe that Love can.

A Goodbye to Stephen Ministry By Evelyn Lape

We are all familiar with Ecclesiastes 3 which tells us, "for everything there is a time." I guess it is past time for me to write a closing for our Stephen Ministry. Our Stephen Ministry actually ended during the Pandemic. Close contact and one-on-one visitation in the homes became impossible then.

Circumstances have changed considerably since we began the SHUP Stephen Ministry in 2000. For 21 years we felt a need and had an active ministry supporting one another with love. Those of us who stuck with it for years hated to see it close, but our congregation had gotten much smaller which made it difficult to find new people able to take the Leader's Training and/or attend the many hours of study. The Pandemic just solidified our feelings that it was time to close the program.

Dr. Gracey originally brought the program to 18 members who began the 52-hours of training required. Betty Rinald and I took that class and then attended the additional Leader's Training for a week Downtown. We



then led many to classes for 52-week sessions in Stephen Ministry. (At least 8 to 10 people each time, even including 6 people from other churches). John Serpa was able to help teach one Series and help do supervision after he also completed both the Stephen Ministry and the Leader's Training Courses. During the years, the congregation sent the two of us, John, Mona Odendahl, Jean Swingenstein and Judy Davidson to the week-long Leader's Training.

The program requires that after the 52-weeks training each Stephen Minister serve for at least 3 years, so we have had over 65 SHUP members who have trained and been Stephen Ministers. (The training included two all-day Retreats. It was a lot of fun, but a lot of study and homework. We

had Speakers for those as well as occasionally Speakers for Continuing Education Supervision. (Supervision is required monthly after completing initial training)). Each of those 65 people cared for at least two, many had four or five care receivers, and some visited weekly with so many they lost count over the years. When I think of the numbers, I am awe struck that so many are dedicated to seeing that this congregation is cared for, and I am confident SHUP people will always care for one another in the future.

We are fortunate Rev. Dr. Laura is with us who is an extremely caring and vibrant pastor. So we can be sure our members will be cared for by her and each other.

We thank you all for the support of the SHUP Stephen Ministry when it was most needed. And we are thankful for the many hours all those Stephen Ministers spent supporting our pastors, studying, and caring for our SHUP congregation.

Monday, April 22 - Thursday, May 2, 2024

Contemplate the Sacred within Nature

Embrace a Simpler Life

We will be staying in Buddhist guest houses, known as shukubo. There will be shared bathing facilities and beds will be futons upon tatami floors, in keeping with Japanese tradition. All meals at the shukubo are vegetarian.

Discover Sacred Spaces

Our trip leaders, Rev.'s DePoe and Strauss will guide us through the sacred temples of Koyasan, providing Christian reflection on how this different tradition helps illuminate and enrich our own. While discussion will be dynamic, the pilgrimage will focus on respite, retreat, and spiritual growth that leads to renewal.

The above includes daily breakfast in Tokyo, accommodations, train tickets to and from Koyasan, daily breakfast and dinner in Koyasan. Cost **does not** include airfare, public transportation, tax, gratuities, or meals not otherwise mentioned. We recommend budgeting \$1500 for roundtrip airfare.

COVID-guidelines set by Japan's government will act as the guidelines for this trip. These will be communicated to attendees as we grow closer to April 2024. Proof of vaccination is required.

A non-refundable deposit of \$500 is due by September 8, 2023 to reserve a spot for this trip. Spaces are first-come, first served. Passports must have six months left until expiration following May 2024. Contact Rebecca DePoe or Laura Strauss with questions.
